

Healing Clinic: Phase 1

- 15,000 Square foot facility on health care zoned property
- Licensed/certified and inspected by state and federal agencies, including DEA
- Up to 250 patients within Jefferson/Clallam Counties
- Estimated 40-50 employees
- Patients ramped up slowly over a 2-year period





Healing Clinic: Progress

- Building is quickly progressing
- Starting staff recruitment
- Working on federal and state certifications/requirements
- On track to open March/April 2022





Healing Clinic: Recruitment Plans

- Currently recruiting for Medical Director (MD or DO)
- Will begin recruitment for licensed positions in October:
 - PA-C - LMHC - SUDP - RN
 - LCSW - LMFT - SUDPT - LPN
 - SUDP
 - SUDPT
 - RN
 - LPN
- Recruitment for unlicensed staff to begin around December
- All positions will start within 1st quarter of 2022
- Recruitment strategies will include out of area recruitment



Healing Clinic: Services

- Daily dosing of methadone or suboxone (or monthly Vivitrol or Sublocade)
- Individualized treatment plans to address total patient health
- Behavioral health services including outpatient psych care/med management, counseling (1:1 and groups)
- Substance use disorder counseling (1:1 and groups)
- Primary Care
- Dental Care
- Case Management
- Child-Watch
- Transportation for Clallam and Jefferson Co residents
- Care coordination with other local agencies and resources



Healing Clinic: Safety Plan

- Extensive coordination with local law enforcement and community leaders
- On-site security team, systems and protocols
- Training of all staff
- Patient education and agreements
- Gradual increase of patient load to make adjustments to facilities, training, etc



Healing Clinic: Support

- The support of Jefferson County's health care and behavioral health professionals is greatly appreciated!
- Ongoing community voice regarding need for JHC and how we can improve the lives of Olympic Peninsula residents
- Continued effort to address stigma in our communities



The Need for Community Care in Clallam and Jefferson County

People in our region need opioid treatment services, and they need them close to home and in a well-managed facility. The Jamestown S'Klallam Tribe is in the process of planning and building a new Healing Clinic to care for patients in Clallam and Jefferson counties. We have a proven track record of providing first-class health services in this region, and we care deeply about enhancing community wellness.

We believe a holistic service delivery approach is most effective at providing sustained recovery for those struggling with addiction. That's why in addition to offering chemical dependency relief, the Healing Clinic will offer behavioral health, primary care, dental care, childcare assistance, and transportation if needed. And for those in need of additional social services like securing food, housing, or job training, our community partners will be on site, ready to connect patients with vital community resources.



- Assume that any pill, powder, or other drug you get from a dealer, friend or online source probably has fentanyl in it.
- Don't use alone or call a friend when you do. They can get help if you need it.
- Carry naloxone, and let others know where you keep it. Naloxone can reverse a fentanyl overdose although in some cases it may take more doses because fentanyl is so potent. You should also call 911, just like for any medical emergency, so extra help is on the way.

OCH's Community-Information Exchange Survey

Community-information exchange survey (CIE)

The purpose of [this survey](#) is to connect with health serving (physical, behavioral, dental, social) organizations and Tribes throughout the Olympic region to learn about the functions, purpose, interest, and commitment to a closed-loop, bi-directional, digital communications platform. Results from this survey will be compiled and presented to the OCH Board of Directors to inform next steps. OCH recognizes that this has been a long-standing priority of the region and that there have already been a few attempts to identify a path forward. We appreciate your time in continuing this important conversation. **OCH will pay your organization or Tribe \$100 for participating** (one payment per organization/Tribe regardless of how many people complete the survey) if you provide your name and email while submitting the survey.

- **Community-Information Exchange (CIE):** A network of partners – social service agencies, community-based organizations, Tribes, government, physical and behavioral health organizations – who commit to coordinating care so that individuals have better access to the care and supports needed to improve their health.
- **Health-Information Exchange (HIE):** Transmission of health-related data among health (physical, behavioral, dental) providers.
- **Care coordination:** Deliberate organization of patient/client care activities and sharing information to achieve safer and more effective care.
- **Bi-directional:** Information moving in two directions (to and from participating partners). Bi-directional systems result in communication that can be received and sent by all parties in compliance with HIPAA and 42 CFR Part 2 requirements.
- **Closed-loop referral:** The sending provider (referrer) receives communication from receiving provider (referee) on current status of referral with the ultimate goal of completion of service.
- **Community-Clinical Linkages:** Connections between community and clinical partners to improve population health. When clinical and community partners work together, we create better health outcomes for everyone.


