



This Plan will address various communication needs through personalized messaging. The Communications Plan and its individual components will include: distinct project-phase-related communications, as well as help address stigma associated with addiction and mental health. # Regional: OCH Receives \$245K Funding to Reduce Stigma in Region

## S.B.A.R. Cambia Behavioral Health Donation

### Situation

Cambia Health Solutions is interested in making a \$245,000 donation to Olympic Community of Health to address the mental health and wellbeing of people and families in rural communities impacted by the COVID-19 pandemic and to advance work to break down the stigma surrounding mental health and improve equitable access to behavioral health services.

### Action

Staff propose utilizing the funds to support a multi-year effort in the region, especially related to substance use. This includes interviews with partners and community members to evaluate current approaches better and more fully. Activities that could include:

- Training and learning opportunities for staff and community at-large including learning and alignment with best practices
- Communications and marketing materials to share best communications best practices to move forward
- Partner convenings to discuss challenges related to stigma; and
- As needed telehealth support including client devices and other technology as HCA begins to wind down their support in the area.

# Of Note...Regionalized Public Health Discussion

Both were selected by the Association of Public Health Officials and the Association of Counties to join a joint task force discussing these bills as they move through the legislature.

Both bills were introduced on Jan.12. HB 1152 was referred to the Health Care and Wellness committee while SB 5173 was referred to the Health and Long Term Care committee.

The boundaries of the proposed health regions have not been outlined yet, but the bills say they must include a population of at least 250,000 that would be overseen by one health officer, Locke said.

The most likely region for Clallam and Jefferson would include Kitsap and potentially Mason counties, said Dean in a phone interview Wednesday.

While there may be changes to the legislation as it moves through various committees, as it's currently drafted, it would move the main administrative services for each county to the largest county in the region — Kitsap for Clallam and Jefferson's potential region — with smaller service offices located at the individual counties, she said.



If the legislation is approved, the regional health department would have a Board of Health comprised of one to two representatives of each county with one health officer overseeing all counties in the region, she said.



“The biggest concern is that we get to set priorities and policies at local levels that we may not be on the same page with other counties,” said Dean, who added that Jefferson County’s public health department is one of the largest county-run departments with an annual budget of \$5 million.

Toward the end of the article note that there isn't a planned 2nd phase at this time, and they are on record around housing:

**"• Homelessness/housing**  
 Cunningham said he's unaware if any of the tribe's existing MAT patients are "truly homeless." He described patients who leave the program as diverse, with some leaving the program because they move, stop coming or reach sobriety. "They do not set up tents or in neighborhoods around town," Cunningham said. He said some patients take "months or years to build up courage to talk to anyone about their addiction." Both Cunningham and Simcosky said there are no plans to add additional housing north of the proposed facility. Early plans discussed a 16-bed inpatient facility in its second phase but were dropped, tribe officials previously said. When asked about the proposed second phase, Wilke said she believes there's a caveat that allows the tribe to later pursue a second phase with the phrase "unless a future need." "The public has no recourse if there is sovereign immunity," she said. Murphy contested this saying tribal officials face perjury for lying about no second phase and that the only reference to housing is an outdated map labeled as future housing. Crain testified that the city's homelessness count has remained consistently low for more than a decade."

# Regional: OCH Receives \$245K Funding to Reduce Stigma in Region

## S.B.A.R. Cambia Behavioral Health Donation

### Situation

Cambia Health Solutions is interested in making a \$245,000 donation to Olympic Community of Health to address the mental health and wellbeing of people and families in rural communities impacted by the COVID-19 pandemic and to advance work to break down the stigma surrounding mental health and improve equitable access to behavioral health services.

### Action

Staff propose utilizing the funds to support a multi-year effort in the region, especially related to substance use disorder. Staff conducted interviews with partners and community members to assess current approaches better and more fully understand the needs of activities that could include:

- Training and learning opportunities for staff and community at-large including learning and alignment with community
- Communications and marketing materials to share best communications best practices to move forward
- Partner convenings to discuss challenges related to stigma; and
- As needed telehealth support including client devices and other technology as HCA begins to wind down their support in the area.


